Year 7 History (KS3)

Curriculum Overview

Skills baseline assessment using Henry VIII and his problems as the focus topic. Henry VIII was taught in KS2 and the Historical skills needed to develop explanation and analysis should have been put in place at KS2. This assessment does not test knowledge but it will test skills linked to source evaluation and analysis as well as extended writing. The causes and significance of the battle of Hastings is taught, again focusing on explanation skills. Students will study the impact of the Black Death upon the lives of the peasants in England and appreciate that the disease had a positive as well as a negative impact upon the people of England. The Peasants' Revolt is a causation exercise and explores the motives behind the challenge to authority. Interpretation is then taught in more depth during the study of the English Civil war and the Industrial Revolution. Lastly, the Slave Trade and the Civil Rights Movement is studied with a particular focus on local history.

Year 8 History (KS3)

Curriculum Overview

The year starts with the causes and the development of WW1. There will be a focus on the short and long term causes of the War. Pupils will develop their analysis of source work and evaluation skills, through focusing on primary evidence in recruitment and propaganda throughout the course of WW1. There will also be a focus on trench life, weapons and the Battle of The Somme. Pupils will then explore the social and political impact and changes on American society during the 1920s. This is followed by the rise of Hitler to the position of Chancellor in Germany in 1933. From this there is an investigation into Anti-Semitism through time. There is then a study in to the American entrance into World War Two with a focus on Pearl Harbour. Using Pearl Harbour pupils will display the ability to use causation skills when studying the Atomic bomb. Pupils will be asked to justify if they believed it was form of retaliation, this will be conveyed in an extended piece of writing. There will then be a focus in to the Cold War/Cuban Missile crisis and the Berlin Blockade. Lastly, pupils will explore the social and political impact that different forms of terrorism (Global and National) have had on the people's lives both at nationally and internationally.

Unit 1: Understanding the Modern World America, 1920-1973: Opportunity and inequality (Period study) Conflict and tension, 1918-1939 (World-wide depth study).

Unit 2: Shaping the Nation Britain: Power and the people: c1170 to the present day (Thematic study) Norman England: c.1066-1100 (British depth study including the historic environment).

Unit 1 is studied in Year 10. Unit 2 is studied in Year 11.

Examinations/Key Assessments

Unit 1 (Paper 1) comprises 50% of final mark.

Unit 2 (Paper 2) comprises 50% of final mark.

Homework

Curriculum Overview

The A Level Government and Politics specification is designed to encourage students to develop their critical thinking skills and enhance their ability to interpret, evaluate and comment on the nature of politics. Students acquire knowledge of the structures of authority and power within the political systems of both the United Kingdom and the United States. They are also encouraged to think and debate more widely about how other political systems may differ. In this course students will learn to weigh up evidence against opinion and understand how people's lives are affected by political activity. You will develop a critical awareness of political events and issues.

Examinations/Key Assessments

A Level Government and Politics is assessed by a terminal exam. There will be opportunities to take part in city wide debates with other schools, as well as a visit to the Houses of Parliament, and attend a Question Time session with our local MP.
